## **Enjoy Advent** *by Rodney Nicholson*

It is excellent that Advent begins with the Pocklington Singers' presentation of "The Messiah" on December 1<sup>st</sup>. What better way could there be for getting our hearts in tune with this season of anticipation than by absorbing Handel's glorious music in harmony with Isaiah's immortal poetry! We change gear, but only slightly, as we sing more great words and draw near to Christ the Messiah at the Advent Family Communion and Christingle the following morning.

Christmas is in the air. You can hardly avoid it in many shops – and who would blame those retailers? Kathleen and I record all the television programmes we watch – we see nothing live – which means we skip the adverts if we're viewing an ITV broadcast. Once or twice, though, lately I have deliberately watched the adverts and realised that from early November, I guess, Christmas is pushed. When it comes to families, we have probably decided by now where we're going, or who's coming to us on Christmas Day.

At church we need to have the rotas for Christmas done by November or earlier. I do a little speaking for The Children's Society at Christingle services. This year I'll be at Hessele, Pickering and Osbaldwick. We're having our deanery clergy quiet morning (currently a small group!), joined by two Readers at Wydale Hall on December 6<sup>th</sup> (St Nicholas Day, as it happens). And I've just got my invitation to Christmas lunch at Warter School the following week. That said, I want to postpone Christmas for two or three weeks and enjoy Advent.

Christmas focuses on the infant Jesus; Advent on the glorious, returning Christ. "Away in a manger" is sweet; "Lo, he comes with clouds descending" is soul-stirring. "Every eye shall then behold him, robed in dreadful majesty," as Charles Wesley's hymn continues. We must avoid hurrying to Christmas and so bypassing the majesty of Advent. "Are you ready for Christmas?" "I hope not – I haven't experienced Advent yet.

Looking on the internet, I see that we are spoilt for choice with Advent calendars. If Beauty is your thing, there's a Lookfantastic calendar at £79 or an Elemis 25 Days of Beauty for £150. Drinkers, on the other hand, might opt for a Beer Hawk Advent calendar (£49.95), a Prosecco and Champagne version (£124.99) or a Whisky alternative (£249.99). If we stick to chocolate, there's a fair trade option: Divine dark chocolate Advent calendar for £5. They are a long way from the traditional Advent calendars with biblical or Christian pictures, looking forward to the birth of Christ at Bethlehem, but at least the Divine chocolate comes in the right spirit.

Advent, then, invites us to prepare for Christmas by reading, or hearing read, the unfolding story in the Old Testament. This tells of God preparing his people for the day when he would come to earth personally in his Son Jesus Christ. It also looks forward to the time when Christ will come again to bring in the new heaven and the new earth

Dear Friends,

December is taken up mostly by the wonderful Advent season and then, just as the days are at their darkest, we come to Christmas!

This month we would like to take you back in time and begin with some very ancient words attributed to St. Andrew of Crete (c. 660-740). He wrote these words:

‘The one who is present everywhere and fills everything is coming. He is coming to fulfil among you the salvation offered to all. Welcome him who welcomed everything that pertains to our human nature.’

As we prepare to welcome our Lord and Saviour afresh into our hearts and lives, we would like to invite you spend some quiet moments of prayer amidst all the rush of our hectic lives. We offer you some Bible verses to help in your stillness. They contain wonderful promises of hope and encouragement, needed by us all in these uncertain days. You may like to read them, just one each day as you have time, and then sit in silence and reflect on them, allowing God to come to you in whatever way you need. All the Bible verses are from the Old Testament prophets, some of them are famous verses, others are less well known. Here are our suggestions:

Isaiah 9:7 Promises of peace and justice

Jeremiah 29: 11-13 God’s plans for us.

Ezekiel 37: 9-10 Life in the midst of death.

Daniel 6: 26-27 The indestructible kingdom of the living God.

Hosea 6: 1-3 Wonderful promises of healing and new life.

Amos 5: 23-24 A call to live in just and right ways.

Habakkuk 3: 17-19 Joy in God in the midst of trouble.

This is not a complete list of all the Old Testament prophets, but these certainly speak to us in this Advent season. There are three more whom we would like to bring to you in more detail. We find ourselves with three sermons to prepare for Advent in All Saints, Pocklington and we would like to use these times by looking with you at the three Old Testament readings for those Sundays – extracts from the prophecies of Malachi, Zephaniah and Micah. These are wonderful, timeless words which speak powerfully to us today.

One final thought...as you wrap your presents this year, why not pray a prayer for each person as you wrap their gift!

### **Archbishop “not” retiring**

The Archbishop of York is reported as retiring. He retires in 2020, whereas it was thought he might retire next year. It is truer, therefore, to say that he is **not** retiring until then. He is keen to evangelise and lead more missions, which it is wonderful for an archbishop to be doing. A member of the Minster congregation told me earlier in the year that someone had said to her, “We don’t have bishops and archbishops like we used to.” My answer is (and she agreed with me), “How many archbishops and bishops in the past went on a mission to other dioceses, preaching the Good News of Christ?” Archbishop Sentamu has a passion for evangelism and, in that regard, is walking in the path of the apostles. Carlisle, Durham, Newcastle, Blackburn and Sheffield diocese have all received a mission visit from Sentamu with a supporting team of bishops and other Christians.

### **Custody in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century**

The Ladies Breakfast on Saturday 24th November, at the Lilypad Cafe Burnby Hall Gardens was addressed by Alison Watson who now works at HMP Humber and is also one of the Brownies leaders here at All Saints. Starting on the graduate scheme she has worked in prisons at Doncaster, Manchester, Lancaster, Wetherby and Hull. Alison gave a fascinating insight into her role in the prison and how the problems inside reflect those on the outside such as drugs and violence. There are a number of different denominations of clergy who visit the prison on a regular basis. Since 2012 staffing reductions have caused additional issues within the prison service but are now being addressed. The footprint of HMP Humber is about twice the size of Burnby Gardens.

## **Gambling: bane or blessing? by Rodney Nicholson**

Denise

Coates (51), the chief executive of an on-line betting company, earns £265 million a year. "Obscene", we may say, "that such a high salary should come from other people's sickness and addiction." Ms Coates, however, is doing nothing wrong and indeed pays £90m in income tax. From the profits of her company, Bet365, which she founded in 2000, she set up the Bet365 Foundation six years ago which has given £100m to charities at home and abroad. Oxfam, Cafod, typhoon victims in the Philippines and a local college helping vulnerable young people have all received generous grants. Denise and her husband, Richard Smith, adopted four children from the same family five years ago. To many people, therefore, her betting company has been a blessing and, no doubt, a life saver.

At the same time, on-line betting must be viewed as a bane and a curse. It cannot be healthy for people to seclude themselves in front of their computer and squander money that they can ill afford to lose. Bet365 recognises the problem and indeed donates money to the treatment of addicted gamblers. Last year, however, the amount donated from the entire gambling industry roughly equalled 1/22<sup>nd</sup> of Ms Coates's salary. He or she must be a sad or desperate or greedy person who throws money away on on-line gambling. It can hardly be viewed as a wise and wholesome activity. So, in spite of generous donations, the gambling industry lays itself open to the charge of trading on people's folly and causing misery to thousands.

Nearly thirty years ago the Church Urban Fund was launched to finance church-based projects in inner city and deprived areas. In Blackburn diocese we set ourselves the target of raising £750,000 over four years, plus another £250,000 to be spent locally. Every deanery and parish had a target, and one day in 1994 or 1995 we had a great service in the Cathedral to celebrate the completion of the appeal. Just as an aside, our deanery action group agreed from the start that there would be no raffles or gambling activities as these would conflict with the policy of one or two churches. One mellows or softens with the years and, today, I don't have a problem with an "innocent raffle", as it's hard to see anyone being corrupted by buying a £1 ticket the Christmas fair.

But what about the National Lottery? I have never bought a ticket in my life because I don't like losing money. Yes, 28p in the £1 goes to charity but I want my entire £1 to go to a charity of my choosing. I give to specific charities, not "charity" in general. At the same time, one of my previous parishes benefited from a Lottery grant, just as some churches today are greatly helped by such funding. And well done, those applicants, who must work extremely hard to have any hope of winning a grant. The Lottery, therefore, certainly brings blessing. It also leads many poorer people to spend money, which they simply cannot afford, in the vain hope that they might win and have all their problems solved.

"If I win the Lottery, I'll give you some money for the church". How often has that been said to me! My unspoken reply is, "That'll be the day. I'd rather have just £10 now."

Gambling is based on desire and uncertainty. As Christians, our desire is to please God and so find fulfilment of life. Of course we live with uncertainty but we have the certainty of knowing we are loved by God who, in the words of the prophet Jeremiah, gives us "a future and a hope"
